VYC Historian 2014-2015



Historical Notes

These two Historical Notes from the past are from The VYC – The First 100 Years. They were written by Club historian Tom Hosley P/C. "The following was published in the Aug. 10, 1901 Vallejo Evening

Post and reprinted in the March 1984 Binnacle." (Pg. 514) "The Vallejo Yachting and Boating Club is the youngest nautical organization on San Francisco Bay. It was organized in April, 1900 by a few enthusiastic amateur sailors in Vallejo. During the five years previous to that time, several attempts were made to launch such an organization, but it was not until W.J. Wood took up the scheme that anything like success became apparent...

The piling (of the clubhouse) was put in place by the first week in February of this year. Then came the erection of the headquarters. The cost of the foundation had exceeded the amount the officers had figured on, then when it came to putting up the house they found they would have to go into debt. This they were not willing to do, so they set about to devise some means whereby they could have what they wanted and at the same time do it with the money at hand. It was decided to call on the members to do the work themselves. Carl Siebrand, an architect who some years ago designed the home of the Seattle Yacht Club, was in a position to know just what was wanted and has laid out the best appointed clubhouse on the Bay. Not only did he furnish the plans, but he has superintended the building of the structure. The clubhouse is almost completed and in a short while will be thrown open to the members and their guests. As the name of the Club signifies, the interests of those who are disciples of the "white ashbreeze" are considered and rowing is fostered by the Club. Mare Island Straits is an ideal place for rowing. At the turn of the tide on a summer evening, when the moon shines forth in all its glory, the waters seem fairly alive with the clean-cut pleasure boats, freighted down with maids and matrons whose sweet voices lifted in song remind one of far-off Venice. So between

the yachts when the winds blow high and blow low and the small boat when there is not a breath stirring, the Vallejo Yachting and Boat Club can always offer some attractions to its members."

"The following was published in the March 1993 Binnacle." (Pg. 515) "The earliest surviving records of junior membership are found in the Register of the Vallejo Yachting and Rowing Club which lists the names of members in all classes of membership from 1900 to 1939. One section lists the junior members starting in 1909.

According to the two earliest surviving bylaws, 1901 and 1905, the minimum age for regular membership was eighteen years. No provision for junior membership was included. The Register lists 23 names as junior members in 1909.

Sadly, the first person listed named Barry, who joined on Jan. 28, 1909, was also noted as drowned on July 17, barely six months after he became a member. This 1909 listing of twenty-three junior members was the largest recorded. Many years have as few as three junior members on the roll. A total of 93 junior members were listed between 1909-1939. Apparently, a relatively small number of junior members stayed on to become active regular Club members. Some notations after their names show "moved to senior list" but only a few of these appear on the senior list for very long. Most often the word "suspended" was the notation!

At least three of the early junior members played major leadership roles in the Club as regular members. Herman Streichen joined the Club as a junior member on March 31, 1910. His boat was listed as Lois, an 18-foot open cruiser. Seven years later, in 1917, he had risen to be Commodore. Streichen was drafted into the army on 1918 and served overseas in France. After World War I, he returned and was Commodore for the second time in 1920. Herman Streichen continued his leadership role by serving as Vice Commodore in 1930, 1935, and 1936. He was a member of the Board of Directors in 1937, 1946, and 1947 and was Fleet Captain in 1943. Streichen was well known around

the yacht club as a "hotrod" power boat skipper in his power cruiser Empah and earlier in his 1924 H-3 hydroplane Gertrude.

Oscar Setterquist also joined the Club as a junior member in 1910. His boat was Nymph. Oscar served as Port Captain in 1914. He is memorialized in the photo on the clubhouse wall as the man riding the new float, at a precarious angle, during its launching. Setterquist had a long career in public service for the City of Vallejo and has a park named for him.

Clarence "Red" Fox was the other notable junior who

had a distinguished career at VYC. He joined as a junior member in 1920 and became Commodore only two years later at the age of twenty-two. He served as Commodore four times and remained an active member of the Club for over 65 years."

These are just two historical notes that I thought you would be interested in reading and there are many more to write, but I will do so in another article.

MESSAGE FROM OUR CLUB MANAGER

THE STATE OF THE CLUB

Dear Shipmates,

As any of the members and officers who have attended the last couple years of VYC Board Meetings can attest, running an American corporation these days is challenging. We regularly receive notices from our vendors telling us due to, e.g. 'higher fuel costs,' prices will be raised. That happened by the dozen around 2010-2012. Of course, we all know gas came down significantly this year. And yet...where are the relief notices? Things only go up. Using PG&E as one example, Vallejo YC paid \$3877 recently, for electric and gas, yet only \$2500 in earlier years. That's a jump of almost \$1400...per month! Project that out for a few years, and you can see what I'm talking about. Heck, even Club burgees, which are such a neat part of membership, have become expensive enough that the Club can't give them away. I miss that already, as people always light up when holding a crisp Club burgee in their hand.

And then there's the Seawall. One of my proudest moments as your Manager was the day (then) Chairman Perkins and (then) Treasurer Mendonca inked the re-financed loan that saved our Club. It was a ton of work. If you remember the US economy in 2009, then you know how touch-and-go our negotiations were. This investment protects our harbor for another 50 years. However, the Bank o' West automatic debit is \$15,283, and it happens every 30 days. That's our mortgage, folks!...Every single month it's \$15k+.

With the awesome membership we have at VYC, and all the beautiful boats, we would be one of the richest, most cash-heavy clubs in the whole North Bay, were it not for our mortgage. But that's the way it goes. A wall that was quoted at 1 million dollars in the year 1999 cost us \$2.1m when we finally splashed that steel. (I am looking forward to our VYC mortgage burning party - 2027!)

We last raised your dues in 2010 and the berth prices in 2011. The current VYC Board voted to raise berthing by 75 cents a foot and the dues were raised by 5 dollars a month. These modest increases, effective March 1st, will go a long way in helping our Club meet its obligations. We thank you for your understanding and your participation.

And lest you think it's only increases, we are actively attacking our expenses, as well. PG&E is low hanging fruit: we've invested in LED lights for the clubhouse and motion detectors, so lights will use less juice, and go out upon exiting (a particular sore spot, historically). A Point of Sale System for the bar/galley is coming online mid-March. Inventory will now be tracked as never before. We knocked trash collection down from twice, to once a week, and cut things like linen rentals and floor runners, etc.

This Club has weathered so much in fine style, and we look forward to putting a more corporate stamp on our business affairs, to ensure fiscal health in perpetuity. Thank you so much for loving the Vallejo Yacht Club!

PICYA REPORT

History of PICYA for those who are not familiar with what PICYA is and what it does, the Pacific Inter-Club Yacht Association was formed in San Francisco on May 12, 1896 to promote cooperation between Bay Area yacht clubs. Charles G. Yale of the San Francisco Yacht Club was its first president. For some time prior to this, the major San Francisco Bay yacht clubs were considering an organization for inter-communication, uniform racing rules and to encourage yachting. The five charter clubs and the year they were founded were: California Y.C. (1893), Corinthian Y.C. (1886), Encinal Y.C. (1890), Pacific Y.C. (1873) and the San Francisco Y.C. (1869).

First PICYA Regatta The first PICYA Regatta was held on Sept. 9, 1896, California Admission Day. Joseph M. MacDonough donated a sterling silver trophy in the name of his father Joseph MacDonough Sr., a prominent yachtsman active in PICYA and Commodore of Pacific Y.C. from 1881-1882. The first winner of the trophy was "Truant," (CYC).

Opening Day on the Bay The largest single PICYA event is "Opening Day." This was a term used in the early 1890's when it was associated with the first activities of individual yacht clubs celebrating the spring season. It gradually became identified with the manual opening of the bridge at Corinthian Island, Marin County. This was an event viewed by yachtsmen and local residents as sailboats and "arks" passed through. These had been stored in Tiburon Lagoon to protect them from the ravages of winter.

Recreational Boaters of California or RBOC One of PICYA's greatest contributions to the betterment of boating has been its effort in the legislative field. 1965 marked the leap forward when the necessity for an organization to make legislators aware of boat owners' needs and to guard against an increasing number of adverse bills being submitted in the legislature. This resulted in the nonprofit corporation, 'Boat Owners Associated Together' or B.O.A.T. formed by Past Presidents of PICYA as the first trustees. The Southern California Yachting Association was contacted to bring their half of the state into the field. B.O.A.T. was then reorganized to emerge as a statewide organization in September of 1968 making it an effective state legislative watchdog. In 1983 the name was changed to 'Recreational Boaters of California' or R.B.O.C. Each year nine directors appointed by PICYA and nine directors appointed by SCYA join in Sacramento to visit with Senators and Assembly members from their areas. This has been a very effective method of communication. In 1970, its success was attributed largely to the capable work of Executive Director, Jerry Desmond, Sr. and his staff.

Club of the Year or COTY In 1993, Director George Neil of Richmond Y.C. developed the PICYA "Club of the Year" program to honor the clubs whose delegates were most effective in facilitating club participation in PICYA events. Clubs earned points in many categories including attendance at Delegates Meetings and participation in PICYA seminars and regattas. The member club with the most points at the end of each year would be named PICYA "Club of the Year." The first club to win this award was Bel Marin Keys Y.C.

PICYA Wheelchair Regatta In 1997 Staff Commodore Margot Brown, (1995, first woman Commodore of PICYA) proposed a Wheelchair Regatta to honor disabled veterans with a boat tour of the Bay and a luncheon. There were 8 boats and 68 disabled veteran participants. Encinal Y.C. with its natural location and no public service event at that time was a good fit. There was a great deal of enthusiasm for the event at the time and it has increased in size and participation every year. It continues to be held at Encinal Y.C. on the last Saturday in Sept. as PICYA's charity event.

Current PICYA Activities The first PICYA meeting of 2015 was the PICYA Delegate Dinner at the Stockton Yacht Club, on Monday, Feb. 2, 2015. The new PICYA officers who presided are Commodore Liz Allison, Half Moon Bay Yacht Club, Vice Commodore Erich Schoenwisner, Alameda Yacht Club, Rear Linda Blue, Petaluma Yacht Club, and Junior Staff Commodore Lenora Clark, Ebony Yacht Club. The OYC earns 4 Club of the Year points for the attendance of a PICYA delegate at each regular meeting.

Installation of the newly elected PICYA Officers for 2015 took place at the PICYA Commodore's Ball and Installation of Officers at the St. Francis Yacht Club on Saturday, January 24th. The Vallejo Yacht Club had one attendee at the Ball, PICYA Delegate Maggie Sabovich, so earned only 4 Club of the Year points for this event.

The first opportunity for the VYC to earn another 10 COTY points for 2015 was the submission of current VYC fleet, member and officer data and photo information to the PICYA Yachting Yearbook editor/publisher Patti

Mangan by the announced deadline of January 4th. All updated fleet, member and 2015 officer data and photos were emailed.

The next PICYA event where 15 Club of the Year points may be earned is by attendance of VYC Officers and Directors at the PICYA Spring Leadership Conference, which is to be held at the Aeolian Yacht Club in Alameda on Sat., March 21, registration/continental breakfast at 8:00 AM and a luncheon at noon. The cost is \$25.00/person. Deadline for registration is Monday, March 16. Registration forms can be found at www.picya.org See COTY chart below for point count.

PICYA sponsors the 98th annual Opening Day on the Bay, and this year it is scheduled for Sunday, April 26. This event signals the official start of the San Francisco Bay area's 2015 Boating Season, with a decorated boat parade along the San Francisco waterfront made up of boats from Bay Area yacht clubs as well as boats participating from Delta yacht clubs and decorated boats from the general boating public-at-large. PICYA invites officers, directors and club members to view this parade from the Hornblower Fleet's "San Francisco Spirit", which is one of the newer vessels in Hornblower's fleet. Guests can enjoy a continental breakfast as well as a white tablecloth luncheon and no-host bar, and can view the parade of decorated sailboats, power boats, tugboats, S.F. Fire Department boats, large yachts, Coast Guard vessels, and classic and contemporary boats from the comfort and front row seating of the "San Francisco Spirit". Cost for your cruise, breakfast and lunch is \$85 for adults and \$40 for children ages 2-12 years. Boarding is at 9:15 AM and the boat returns to the pier at 2:45 PM. Deadline for registration for the "San Francisco Spirit" PICYA Committee Boat is Monday, April 20th, as seating is limited to 220 guests. Registration forms are on the PICYA website at: www.picya.org

This year's parade theme is "Youth in Boating", which encourages parade entrants to incorporate youth sailing and boating into their decorated boat themes. This parade is judged by esteemed members of the boating community and by military officers involved in protecting our US coastlines. First, second and third prizes are awarded in each of five categories, including Power Decorated to Theme, Sail Decorated to Theme, Junior Decorated to theme (youth sailors help decorate), Flags and Streamers (sail and power) and Undecorated, plus a grand prize for Best Overall Decorated Boat.

Each PICYA member yacht club is expected to contribute donations of money, wine, liquor, boating wear, accessories such as safety gear and appropriate gifts for junior sailors, as this year boat owners are encouraged to include participants from the youth sailing community on their boats in the parade. A total of 50 possible Club of the Year or COTY points may be earned for participation in various categories of Opening Day on the Bay. See COTY Chart below:

January 29, 2015 - The State of CA Dept. of Water Resources (DWR) has announced that it may be necessary to install emergency salinity control barriers across three channels in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta if the weather continues to stay exceedingly dry throughout the spring. DWR may need to seek a permit from the US Army Corps of Engineers that would allow for the temporary installation of rock barriers at intervals over the next 10 years when salt water threatens deep intrusion into the Delta, which could contaminate water supplies for Contra Costa, Alameda and Santa Clara County residents, Delta residents and 25 million California residents who depend upon this water source.

BOATU.S. ACTION ALERT: PROTECT YOUR BOAT, ASK CONGRESS TO FIX THE RENEWABLE FUEL STANDARD

February 4, 2015 - For years, BoatU.S. has been battling in Washington to make sure you can buy gasoline that works in your boat engines. On Wed., February 4, 2015, U.S. Congressman Bob Goodlatte (R-VA) introduced The Renewable Fuel Standard Reform Act of 2015. This bill, which has both Democrat and Republican support, will effectively remove mandates for higher blend ethanol fuels (more than 10%) and allow for investment in other more compatible biofuels. We believe it is a critical step and we are writing you to ask your Congressman to become a co-sponsor and support it.



Today's Chef is Amy Troutner

Chicken Cacciatore: Serves 4-6

This is by far my favorite recipe for this well-known dish. It is very simple to make and has clean, bright flavors. Buy the best chicken you can, it makes all of the difference between a good dish and a great one! Also, San Marzano tomatoes are worth every penny! I like to serve this just with good country bread and butter but egg noodles or potatoes would be lovely too.

3-4 lbs. chicken parts with bone in and skin on (you could buy a whole chicken and cut it into 8 serving pieces)

Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper

3 Tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

1 Tablespoon unsalted butter


1 small onion, minced

2 ribs celery, thinly sliced

1/4 teaspoon red chili flakes (I use about a teaspoon!)

One 28-oz. can Italian plum tomatoes in juice or one 28-oz can crushed tomatoes in purée

Several sprigs of fresh parsley, bay leaves, sprigs of fresh rosemary, and celery leaves, tied in a bundle with cotton twine



2. Add onion, celery, crushed red chili flakes and salt to the fat in the pan and cook over medium heat for about 5 minutes until softened. If using whole tomatoes, crush with your hands or a food processor and add to the pan. Crushed tomatoes can be added directly from the can. Add the herb bundle and simmer sauce for around 5 minutes. Bury chicken in the sauce and simmer, partially covered, until the chicken is cooked through, 25-30 minutes. Remove and discard herb bundle. Serve with plenty of the sauce!


